



From the Jerusalem Catecheses St. Cyril of Jerusalem, Bishop

(Cat. 22, Mystagoga 4, 1. 3-6. 9: PG 33, 1098-1106)
The bread of heaven and the cup of salvation



On the night he was betrayed our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples and said: “Take, eat: this is my body.” He took the cup, gave thanks and said: “Take, drink: this is my blood.” Since Christ himself has declared the bread to be his body, who can have any further doubt? Since he himself has said quite categorically, This is my blood, who would dare to question it and say that it is not his blood?

Therefore, it is with complete assurance that we receive the bread and wine as the body and blood of Christ. His body is given to us under the symbol of bread, and his blood is given to us under the symbol of wine, in order to make us by receiving them one body and blood with him. Having his body and blood in our members, we become bearers of Christ and sharers, as Saint Peter says, in the divine nature.

Once, when speaking to the Jews, Christ said: Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood you shall have no life in you. This horrified them and they left him. Not understanding his words in a spiritual way, they thought the Savior wished them to practice cannibalism.

Under the old covenant there was the bread of presence, but it came to an end with the old dispensation to which it belonged. Under the new covenant there is bread from heaven and the cup of salvation. These sanctify both soul and body, the bread being adapted to the sanctification of the body, the Word, to the sanctification of the soul.

Do not, then, regard the Eucharistic elements as ordinary bread and wine: they are in fact the body and blood of the Lord, as he himself has declared. Whatever your senses may tell you, be strong in faith.

You have been taught and you are firmly convinced that what looks and tastes like bread and wine is not bread and wine but the body and the blood of Christ. You know also how David referred to this long ago when he sang: Bread gives strength to man’s heart and makes his face shine with the oil of gladness. Strengthen your heart, then, by receiving this bread as spiritual bread, and bring joy to the face of your soul.

May purity of conscience remove the veil from the face of your soul so that by contemplating the glory of the Lord, as in a mirror, you may be transformed from glory to glory in Christ Jesus our Lord. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Stewardship Reflection:

“He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick – no food, no sack, no money in their belts.” Mark 6:8

Imagine taking nothing but a stick when you go on a trip. The Apostles must have really trusted in God’s providential care. Think of all the material things “we can’t live without” in today’s world. We make our life’s journey more difficult because of all the material baggage that we drag along. Putting God first in everything and putting our money and possessions second gives us freedom because we don’t become “slaves” to wanting to acquire more things.

The sacrament of unity and love



The spiritual building up of the body of Christ is achieved through love. As Saint Peter says: Like living stones you are built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. And there can be no more effective way to pray for this spiritual growth than for the Church, itself Christ's body, to make the offering of his body and blood in the sacramental form of bread and wine. For the cup we drink is a participation in the blood of Christ, and the bread we break is a participation in the body of Christ. Because there is one loaf, we who are many are one body, since we all share the same bread. And so we pray that, by the same grace which made the Church Christ's body, all its members may remain firm in the unity of that body through the enduring bond of love.

We are right to pray that this may be brought about in us through the gift of the one Spirit of the Father and the Son. The holy Trinity, the one true God, is of its nature unity, equality and love, and by one divine activity sanctifies its adopted sons. That is why Scripture says that God's love has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit he has given us. The Holy Spirit, who is the one Spirit of the Father and the Son, produces in those to whom he gives the grace of divine adoption the same effect as he produced among those whom the Acts of the Apostles describes as having received the Holy Spirit. We are told that the company of those who believed were of one heart and soul, because the one Spirit of the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is one God, had created a single heart and soul in all those who believed.

This is why Saint Paul in his exhortation to the Ephesians says that this spiritual unity in the bond of peace must be carefully preserved. I, therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, he writes, beg you to lead a life worthy of your calling, with all humility and meekness and with patience, bearing with one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit.

God makes the Church itself a sacrifice pleasing in his sight by preserving within it the love which his Holy Spirit has poured out. Thus the grace of that spiritual love is always available to us, enabling us continually to offer ourselves to God as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to him for ever.



Unqualified and Unprepared but the Right Person

There is a popular saying among seminarians: “Often God does not choose the qualified, He qualifies the chosen.” I think this is popular among us seminarians because none of us ever feels qualified to be ordained when we think about the responsibilities that priesthood brings. But that is normal for everyone, I think. Who feels ready to be a parent when the first child is on the way? Or which front-line worker feels qualified to be with someone dying in the hospital? The fact is, life throws so many things our way that we just do not feel qualified for, yet we still need to do.

This is what Jesus asks the Apostles to do in today’s Gospel. Jesus sends them out on a small journey, two by two, to preach and cast out demons. But he commands them not to bring anything with them but the clothes on their backs. No money, no bag, no food, not even an extra set of clothes. And who are the apostles again? Fishermen, tax collectors, zealots, basically none of them was equipped to preach or cast out demons in the first place, and now Jesus sends them out with even less. Seems unfair and cruel until you stop to think, what did they have? They had Jesus. They had the authority that Jesus gave them when he sent them out. And in spending time with Jesus they had begun to build a relationship with Him. Jesus wanted to solidify that beginning of a relationship of trust and he did so by putting them in a situation where they had to trust.

That may seem irresponsible to just go and preach without bringing the essentials, but again we need to look at what the Apostles do have. They were called to go out by Jesus. If there is one thing I have learned at my time at seminary is that if Jesus wants you to go do something He gives the strength and the graces to do it. I mentioned earlier that no seminarian feels qualified to be ordained. On July 3, 2021, a friend of mine who was studying with me in seminary was ordained a priest. He said in his thank you, that no matter how difficult, how dark, or how much doubt the journey brought, he never felt alone or that God left him. If Jesus is calling you, then you do not need anything else. Just walk.

It may seem that I am talking strictly about vocations, particularly to the priesthood. But each one of us has been called to preach and cast out demons just maybe not in the same way as an ordained priest. I am sure we have all been in a situation where someone asked us something about the faith or where we have had to tell somebody that what they are doing is wrong. We preach by living the faith and if necessary by answering those questions. We cast out demons by confronting the evil actions that happen around us. And we can make the excuse that the prophet Amos does in the first reading that, “I am no prophet, nor a prophet’s son” but even there, when God calls us to do something he will give us the grace to do it.

A good friend of mine is a NET missionary. This is his second year doing it and he loves it. When he told me he was going to go the first time I was skeptical and so was he. NET ministries is an international Catholic organization that seeks “To Challenge young Catholics to love Christ and Embrace the Life of the Church.” (Net Ministries of Canada Website) They do this by forming missionary teams of young adults to send them to schools and parishes to help the youth groups there and lead retreats. Now my friend knew he did not get along easily with youth. But he went because he could not shake the fact that he thought God wanted him there. So he prayed, “God if You want me there You make it happen. I’ll do the work. You pull the strings.” So he applied with three months before they stop taking new missionaries. He was accepted and found all the funding he needed to go. He loved it and he grew so much from it. Now he’s doing another year.

If you feel that God is asking you to do something, whether it be volunteer at Church, pray maybe five minutes more a day, or confront that person you’ve been hesitating to, if God wants you to go there then He gives you what you need to walk there.




Reflections on Ephesians 1:3-14

In carrying out this Redemption, our Lord was motivated by his infinite love for man. This love, which far exceeds anything man could hope for, or could merit, is to be seen above all in the universal generosity of God's forgiveness, for though 'sin increased, grace abounded all the more' (Rom 5:20); this forgiveness, achieved by Christ's death on the cross, is the supreme sign of God's love for us, for 'greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends' (Jn 15:13). If God the Father gave up his Son to death for the remission of men's sins, it was to reveal the love that is always greater than the whole of creation, the love that is he himself, since 'God is love' (1 Jn 4:8, 16). Above all, love is greater than sin, than weakness, than 'the futility of creation' (cf. Rom 8:20); it is stronger than death. (St. John Paul II, *Redemptor Hominis*", 9).




